The structure of London

London is a very modern, but also a very old town. The Romans founded the town Londinium near the river Thames. London became bigger and more important during the following centuries. Today London is not only a city but also has its own large region, Greater London, with about 7.5 million people living there. Surrounding Greater London is the so called green belt. The oldest part of the town is the City of London. More than half a million people work there but only about 5 000 actually live there.

The City of Westminster is the political centre of the UK. The most fashionable part of London is the Westend where will find the most expensive stores and apartments. The old harbour used to be in the Eastend of London near the river but now there are modern apartments, office buildings and hotels.
