

DO and MAKE

Do and **Make** are two of the most important verbs in English, but there are two main reasons for this:

Rules for „do“:

Use „do“ when you are speaking about vague, or indefinite activities. These include speaking in general, using „-thing“ words like, something, anything,.....

Examples:

Let´s do something this evening.
He didn´t do anything wrong.

Use „do“ for chores or daily tasks.

Examples:

Did you do your homework?
Let´s do the dishes.

Use „do“ for various jobs and activities ending in -ing like, do some thinking, do some painting ...

Examples:

She´s going to do some reading.
He did some thinking about the problem.

Rules for „Make“

„Make“ is often used for constructing or creating something (NOT for activities).

Examples:

I made a cup of coffee for you.
Did you make this wonderful building?

„Make“ is often used when referring to preparing food of any kind.

Examples:

Sue is making omelets for her kids.
Joe made a wonderful lasagna for us.
